#### SUCCESS STORIES: OUR MEMBERS ARE CONNECTED

Our Digital Inclusion Project has now distributed over 800 Tesco Mobile devices to our members across the UK. Recently, a member provided some feedback on how the device has helped them.

They gave us a heart-warming and thought provoking response that truly shows the impact the devices are having with our members.

"From u/credit to registering for legal requirements such as poll tax and water rates, the access to the internet has been invaluable. I have started to fur-

nish my flat which, especially in lockdown, was impossible. No used stores were open, visiting sellers was against the rules. Without the tablet, I couldn't register for education and vocational courses. Family contact is being rebuilt, in a slow and safe way, as the relationships weren't happening because of my situation. Rebuilding slowly via text,



messenger and email means I have some sort of family support now that I didn't have before. I feel more like a human being, part of society again, which from homelessness is a huge leap. I am human. At last. Mental health support is easier to access and less intimidating too."

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#### SKYLIGHT Q & A: MEET JOYCE WEST, OUR NEW ADMINISTRATOR

# Q.: When did you first join Crisis and what is your role?

My first day was 13 April 2021. I am the Temporary Support Team Administrator.

#### Q.: What did you do before?

I've worked previously for a number of organisations including a professional body supporting housing professionals to create a future in which everyone has a place to call home, the NHS, local authority and within school environments.

I also prepare and deliver 30 minute weekly sessions online sessions for young people at my local church which is great fun but also hard work.



I have a busy, buzzing house filled with my husband, grown up son, his girlfriend, her dog (a lovely Maltese). There's never a dull moment.

#### Q.: What's a typical day like for you at Crisis?

My days at Crisis have been varied and never the same. I start my day by checking emails and making sure they are actioned and that the inbox never gets too full. At the moment, when I am in the office I don't tend to sit at my desk as I have been helping to produce signage and resources. Over time, I will support the team with general administration tasks, management of the meeting room diaries and resources, processing invoices and purchase orders, and checking credit card statements.

#### Q.: Have you ever volunteered and what was your experience of this?

I volunteered many years ago when it was the [former] Walsgrave Hospital helping at mealtimes and providing a bedtime drink to the patients. It was really rewarding chatting to the patients and their visitors and made me appreciate the work that the staff do on the wards.

#### Q..: Cats or dogs?

Well it was cats- I had a lovely tabby cat when I was young. I was a little wary of dogs but that has changed recently as we have a dog living with us and my younger son has just got a golden retriever puppy which is full of energy.

#### WORK, LEARNING AND WELLBEING

The Learning Team are offering some face to face learning sessions again and developing our allotment area with a sheltered space to allow for the unpredictability of the British weather in the shape of a pergola; this should help ensure activities can continue there regardless of the weather.

We've planned a range of wellbeing activities, and some will be held at the allotment. We're also working closely with the



City of Culture on a photography project set to run in the coming weeks providing members with the opportunity to take self-portraits with professional quality equipment, developing their photography skills.


#### HERBERT ART GALLERY AND MUSEUM REOPENS

Excited? They should be, as they have two fantastic and contrasting exhibitions to mark the start of UK City of Culture 2021: **'2 Tone: Lives & Legacies'** and **'UnNatural History'** will both open to the public on Friday 28th May.

UnNatural History, curated by <u>Invisible Dust</u>, explores natural history and climate change, with a range of jaw dropping and thought provoking works of art. Designed to explore the role of art and the artist in natural history, it delves into our




