### FROM OUR DIRECTOR...

This month continues our Skylight's trend for recruiting new staff and keeping our office open safely to continue to offer our members services and support.

Firstly, we welcome Riddhi Prajapati, Clinical Psychologist to our team. Riddhi will be working with both staff and members to increase awareness and understanding of the emotional and psychological needs of our members with experience of the trauma of homelessness. Riddhi is settling into our Skylight full-time and we look forward to working with her.

Over the last four weeks we have been phasing staff back into our offices at James Brindley House. Whilst it has been great to see everyone, we are limiting numbers to 6-7 staff maximum. So far, we have not had to

close our offices and continue to follow strict hygiene and physical distancing measures.

We are recruiting two new roles: a Digital Inclusion Administrator who will support members to confidently access and operate online devices to connect to learning, benefits, employment and hobbies to further their personal progression and development and a Housing Procurement Officer who will build a portfolio of private landlords with properties made available for members looking for accommodation.

We look forward to the next few months with confidence and anticipation as our Skylight goes through a period of unprecedented growth and development during a time of great change.

### **SUCCESS STORIES**

This month we share news of member 'B' who graduated with us this month following a difficult period of homelessness and uncertainty. She is permanently housed now and has just been accepted onto an Access course for Nursing after scoring a stellar 89% on the assessment for the course which secured her place. She also passed her Level 2 English with help from Tasha Reilly, one of our Learning Coaches, studied Maths with Emma and Gemma supported her and her young daughter from a vulnerable start living in a hotel to a life with a home, hope and a future.

Here is what 'B' says about her time with us:

'I am now officially enrolled at college. Required finance approved...I'm extremely grateful for...every support... I am absolutely fine to carry on by myself... I am no longer homeless...I [am] working and supporting myself...it has been a pleasure, I have met you wonderful people...I will be forever grateful.'

### OUR PROGRESSION TEAM IS GROWING ... AND GROWING

Our Skylight Progression team is currently recruiting for a Housing Procurement Officer; this role will help source suitable and sustainable accommodation for our members to move on to and end their homelessness.

This will involve working with Housing Associations and Private Landlords to maximise the supply of suitable homes across the West Midlands for our members. The successful person will work with both Coventry and Birmingham Skylights to identify appropriate matches of members to properties.

This is an exciting role which will greatly support the teams and our members. Our Progression Coaches continue to work hard through lockdown supporting our members remotely and more recently from a social distance where needed, we are so proud that despite the pandemic we are still supporting members into work, learning and ending their homelessness.

### PANDEMIC VOLUNTEERING: THE FACTS ABOUT HELPING OUT

The British public are very well known for being amongst the most generous for volunteering their time, skills and experience. *So, how has the pandemic changed people's attitudes to volunteering or are we just as eager to get involved?* 

According to the NHS, the UK responded generously across sectors and regions with 500,000 signing up in the 24-hour period following the NHS call for support back in March 2020. By early April a staggering 750,000 stood at the ready to deliver medicines, food, drive people to appointments or reach out by telephone to those cut off from contact with others.

Data from the National Council for Voluntary Organisations show that around a fifth of people *in* the *UK volunteers at* least once a month for a year or more.

While men and women report volunteering during the crisis at roughly the same rates, there are some differences:



69% of women say they've offered help to friends, family and neighbours during the pandemic, compared with 59% of men.

Women are also more likely to have taken part in the weekly "Clap for Our Carers", with 70% reporting that they've done so, versus 59% of men.

## SKYLIGHT Q & A: MEET RACHEL PARDNER, ADMINISTRATOR

Q: When did you join Crisis and what is your job?

Q: What did you do before working with Crisis?

A: Before being employed by Crisis, I was volunteering for them for a while. Before this, I worked for various organisations such as F Hinds the Jewellers, Paperchase, BHS and Coventry University. I was also a student studying BSc Exercise, Nutrition and Health Psychology at Coventry University.

Q: How do you enjoy your free time?

A: I really enjoy getting outdoors when able to do so and when the weather permits (good old British weather, hey?!) I enjoy baking, reading and spending time with friends and family. I love arts and crafts when time allows too. Currently, I spend my evenings learning Italian via Duolingo – it's a little bit addictive!

Q: Have you ever volunteered and what was your experience of this?

A: I have spent many years volunteering for various companies/charities. I started volunteering when I was just 7 years old. I would go to work with my parents. I loved helping others and felt like I was achieving something without being tied down at the same time. I've volunteered for Midland Heart in Care Homes, worked with various youth centres doing all sorts of youth work, I've volunteered with St John Ambulance, Coventry University and various Primary schools too...including Special Educational Needs which was my favourite. I love volunteering and believe I always will.

Q: Describe a typical day in the office or working from home

A: A typical working day for me (and many others I am sure) looks very different at the moment. I am still able to cover most admin tasks from home which I'm pleased about. There are a few jobs that I am unable to do from home, which can be a little frustrating, but everyone is having to adapt to 'the new norm' and there's plenty of support in place. I spend my day answering many emails, replying to general enquiries both within the organisation and externally. I help look after the finance for the office too which is one of my favourite parts of my job...unless you ask me at the end of a month!!! I support with booking travel for staff and members. Place orders for staff, member's and the office in general. I help support the office in any way I can from an admin point of view. It's very hard to ex-



plain my day to day role as on paper, it may not look like a lot, but it is a very busy job most of the time!

# Tree of the Week: The Gift of Random Sycamores



I passed this Sycamore on a morning walk into town. Located outside our Coventry Canal Basin area it's unclear if this tree was planted intentionally or just grew from an opportunistic seed (as sycamores often do).
